History.

This institution was formally opened in August, 1871, and has been in successful operation for one year, meeting with unexpected patronage. Its students, at first, were but from the immediate community, but now its patronage is from all parts of the State.

Location.

The village of Ada, where the Normal School is located, is in the midst of a fertile, healthy country, and is easily accessible from all points of the compass, by means of the different railroads of the State—situated on the Pittsburgh, Fort Wayne & Chicago Railroad, midway between the intersections of the Toledo & Dayton road at Lima, and the Cincinnati, Sandusky & Cleveland road at Forest.

Design.

The object of this school is not to assume the position of the College, nor of the Academy or Seminary, but proposes to take an intermediate course, yielding facilities in education that could not be obtained elsewhere. We aim to provide the best means for obtaining a thorough and practical education: an education that will fit the student to occupy successfully any position of public trust: to fill his true position in life.

Recitations.

Each class has a daily recitation of from 45 to 60 minutes, giving a short review of the preceding lesson and reciting the lesson of the day. The subjects and topics are assigned at the previous recitations, giving ample time for full investigation and thought, which will be produced the next day in discussion of principles.

Examinations.

Public examinations, continuing three days, are held at the close of each term. Regular written examinations are also held every four weeks, from which tests and daily recitations the student receives his class grades, and from these his term standing, by which he is advanced to the next higher class.

Lectures.

During the past year a number of practical and entertaining lectures were delivered by Hon. T. W. Harvey, M. A., J. W. Walker, Esq., J. H. Williams, M. D., and Rev. Hall. Arrangements have been made by which lectures upon some scientific and practical subjects will be given once a month, by popular educators secured for that purpose.

Literary Societies.

There are two Literary Societies connected with the institution—the "Philomathonian" and the "Franklin," each of which has a good Library and a Hall well fitted for meetings. The exercises of the Societies are open to the public and are well worthy of its continued patronage. Exercises in Composition, Declamation, Debating and Criticisms every week.

Apparatus.

Apparatus for demonstrating the various sciences has been procured, while new additions will be made as the advancement of the institution demands.

Government.

The discipline is mild and parental, yet firm. Each student is required to render a cheerful obedience to the few rules of the school. The teachers will pay especial attention to the moral welfare of both sexes. Students will not be allowed to attend places of public resort which have a tendency to waste their time and money, and corrupt their morals. Care will be taken to teach the duty of self-government and submission to authority, as a matter of prime importance in the education of youth.

Commercial Science.

Especial attention will be given to classes in Book-Keeping and Penmanship, both theoretical and practical. Students will be drilled in the use of the Day-Book, Journal, Ledger, Cash-Book, Sales-Book, &c; also, in Banking, Partnership and Joint-Stock. The use of mercantile forms and papers will be explained and discussed. No pains will be spared to make the Commercial classes eminently practical and interesting. Classes first take up the theory, and afterwards put theory into practice.

Normal Department.

A class is formed every term for the special instruction of those who intend to prepare themselves for teaching. The exercises consist of lectures on school organization, school government, essential qualifications of the teacher, best methods of imparting instructions, &c. Model classes are formed by procuring the attendance of a number of pupils from the village, of different ages and stages of advancement, who are formed into various classes, when the theories taught are put into practice. Members of the class are called on to teach the child five years old in the first steps as well as those more advanced. After the children are dismissed from the room, the defects and excellencies are pointed out and discussed by members of the class and by the Principal.

Rooms and Boarding.

There has been a scarcity of rooms hereto-fore, owing to the demand. The authorities are making arrangements by which room-rent will be reduced and all be accomodated with first-class rooms. Already one large building is in process of erection and will be completed for occupancy till the beginning of the Fall term. Others will follow soon. Boarding can be had in private families, including room, furniture, light and fuel, from \$3.00 to \$3.50 per week. Those who rent rooms can hire good table board at from \$2.00 to \$2.50 per week.

Remarks.

The institution is free from all sectarian bias.

Classes will be formed at the beginning of each term of the school year in any branch, if called for by a sufficient number of students. No extra classes formed for less than three members unless under peculiar circumstances.

Students are requested to be present at Chapel exercises at 9 o'clock every morning unless excused.

Religious services and Sabbath Schools will be held at the various churches, at which students are respectfully invited to attend.

Those wishing to reap all the advantages possible, should be present at the commencement of the term and continue to the close.

Tuition must be satisfactorily settled in advance. No tuition will be refunded, except in case of protracted sickness.

Text-books can be obtained here at as low rates as anywhere else. It is advisable that students bring along with them as many different text-books as they conveniently can, for reference.

The Normal Term, continuing six weeks, commencing June, 1873, is intended for those who wish to take a short review, preparatory to teaching, and who do not find it convenient to be in attendance a full term or at any other season of the year. Special attention will be given to the Theory and Practice of Teaching during the short session.

All who complete the course assigned in the curriculum, or its equivalent, will be awarded diplomas.

No student is permitted to use tobacco within the school premises.

The sons and daughters of indigent ministers are received at reduced rates of tuition.
